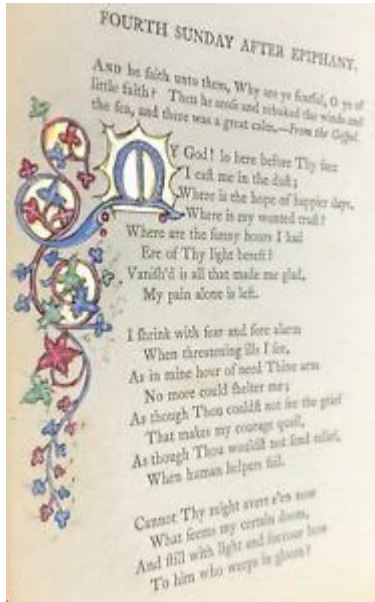

**Helen of Troy**-Ruby Blondell 2015-09-30 Ancient Greek culture is pervaded by a profound ambivalence regarding female beauty.
